The older I get, the stronger that desire for warmth wells up inside me. I have become my mother in more ways than I can count. One of those ways is never feeling warm in the winter. I rush home and crawl under my heating

blanket after a long day (pretty soon I will be wearing long thick pajamas that cover me from neck to toes with thick fluffy slippers).

When I take some time from grumbling about the weather and look out the window to the world beyond, my mind is taken with the beauty of the snow-covered world. Life rests below a protection of snow

meant to keep the harsh winter cold from destroying that life. Life that is waiting for its turn to spring up and produce something for this world beauty, food, protection.

And then I step out into that winter and there is a stillness to it that isn't felt any other time of the year. A waiting and watching for something new. When I used to snowmobile through the northern Minnesota woods, I would stop and admire the world God created. Last month we participated in a program called Mittens of Hope. This program offers an opportunity to bless local children and families with gifts of needed items and toys that they would not have otherwise been able to afford.

This program is coordinated through the Watertown – Mayer Elementary School. There were changes in how the program was run this year. We had been calling the program "Adopt-a-Child" but, in order to correspond with the school program, we (Ruth Clark & I) decided to call it "Mittens of Hope."

In past years, I received one list of needs/ wants for each child. This year we were given paper cut-out mittens with one item on each mitten. A child would usually have several mittens. Once the gifts were purchased and brought to the church, I delivered them to the school. The school social worker then distributed the gifts.

We have been participating in this program since Christmas 2010. The first year, Peace members shopped for 13 children & 1 family. Our biggest shopping year was 2015, 25 children & 1 family. This year, 24 single gifts were purchased for 10 kids. Thank you to everyone who donated gifts.





The following procedure is stated within our constitution. If you meet the requirements listed below and wish to vote via absent ballot for the annual meeting, please notify the Ministry Board. You can send an email to brieckenberg@gmail.com or call 612-770-0774.

A6.05 Voting by proxy shall not be permitted for any matter. Voting by absentee ballot shall be permitted under the following conditions:

- a. The member is out of the state of Minnesota at the time of the congregational meeting.
- b. The member shall notify the Ministry Board of their reason for missing the congregational meeting and their desire to receive an absentee ballot.
- c. The member shall submit their sealed ballot to the congregational President prior to the congregational meeting. The sealed ballot shall be opened and counted with all other ballots during the congregational meeting.
- d. Absentee ballots can only cover elections and ratifications that cannot change during a course of a meeting.
